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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) established the Oregon High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) in June of 1999. Oregon HIDTA was renamed the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA in 2015 with the addition of counties in Idaho. The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA is one of 33 regional HIDTAs in the country and consists of 12 counties in Oregon (Clackamas, Deschutes, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Lane, Linn, Malheur, Marion, Multnomah, Umatilla and Washington) and 4 counties in Idaho (Ada, Bannock, Canyon and Kootenai).

2021 marks the seventeenth year that the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA has reported initiative operational targets and subsequent outcomes using the HIDTA Performance Management Process (PMP) reporting system. The data contained within this report illustrates how the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA is on target for achieving the National HIDTA goals, which are to interrupt the drug market by disrupting or dismantling Drug Trafficking Organizations (DTO) and Money Laundering Organizations (MLO) and to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of HIDTA initiatives.

With support from the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA Investigative Support Center (ISC) and the Oregon and Idaho National Guard Counterdrug Programs, law enforcement initiatives operating in the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA Program continue to make significant progress in identifying, investigating, and disrupting or dismantling the most dangerous and prolific drug dealers and money launderers operating in the region and nation.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

2021 was an eventful year for Oregon-Idaho HIDTA enforcement initiatives, surpassing many previous year outputs and outcomes. Highlights include:

- 83 DTOs and MLOs disrupted or dismantled, representing 120% of projections.
- Seizures of over 753,234 kilograms, 1,768,694 dosage units, and 219 liters of illicit drugs with a wholesale value of \$3.78 billion.
- Over \$17.4 million in illicit cash and other assets seized from DTOs, MLOs and Criminal Organizations.
- 2,307 arrests, 62 wiretaps (lines monitored), 1,331 firearms and 79,094 vape cartridges seized.
- 14,098 hours of training were provided to 1,314 students.
- 1,094 cases supported by intelligence analysts and 7 strategic intelligence products published.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

Oregon-Idaho HIDTA received \$4.54 million in baseline and discretionary funds from the Office of National Drug Control Policy in 2021. Through enforcement efforts, the program generated a return on investment (ROI) of \$835.70 for every \$1 spent on HIDTA budgeted activities.

2021 PROGRAM OUTPUTS AND OUTCOMES

The mission of the HIDTA program is to disrupt the market for illegal drugs in the United States in support of the National Drug Control Strategy by assisting Federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement entities participating in the HIDTA program to dismantle and disrupt DTOs and MLOs, with particular emphasis on drug trafficking regions that have harmful effects on other parts of the United States. The HIDTA program goals are as follows:

- GOAL 1:** Disrupt the market for illegal drugs by dismantling or disrupting DTOs and MLOs; and
- GOAL 2:** Improve the efficiency and effectiveness of HIDTA initiatives

The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA supported 27 initiatives that were responsible for meeting the program goals in 2021. The initiatives were focused on investigations (15), criminal interdiction (3), fugitive apprehension (1), criminal prosecution (1), analytical and deconfliction support (2), Overdose Response Strategy (1), training (1), demand reduction (2) and program management (1). The following is a synopsis of the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA's 2021 outputs and outcomes in support of the program's goals.



GOAL 1: Disrupt the market for illegal drugs by dismantling or disrupting DTOs and MLOs

DTO AND MLO INVESTIGATIONS

In 2021, Oregon-Idaho HIDTA enforcement initiatives investigated 136 DTOs and MLOs operating within the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA region, 83 of which were disrupted and/or dismantled. Many of the DTOs investigated have an identified money laundering function built into their organization.

DRUG SEIZURES

Oregon-Idaho HIDTA initiatives continue to seize higher amounts of methamphetamine and heroin. Cocaine seizures are also increasing along with fentanyl and illicit marijuana. Initiatives reported more than 752,234.98 kilograms, and 1,768,694 dosage units of illicit drugs seized during 2021; 1.5 million of which was fentanyl pills.

The wholesale value of drugs removed from the marketplace in 2021 was \$3.7 billion, a rise of 394% from 2020 values.

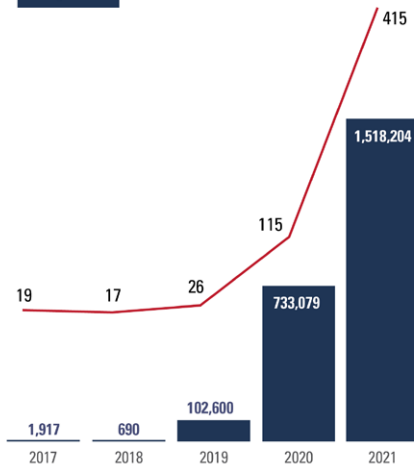
OREGON-IDAHO HIDTA DRUG SEIZURES

dosage units



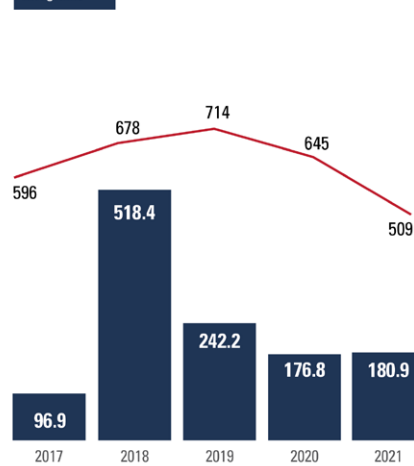

kilograms



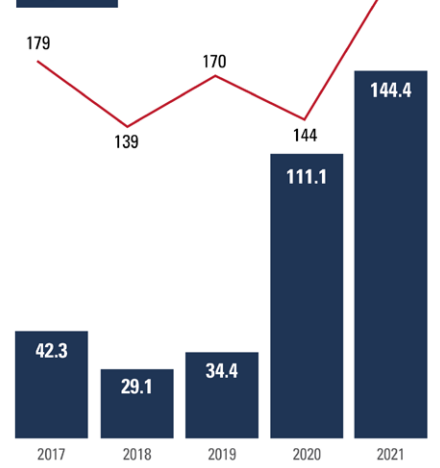

kilograms

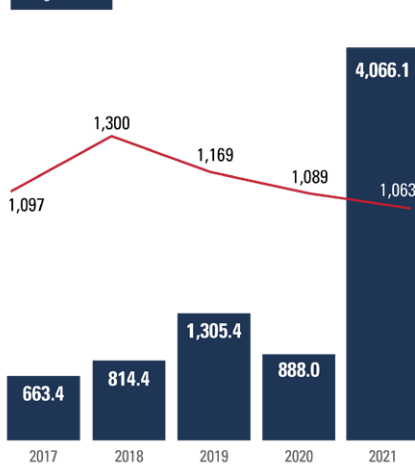

kilograms



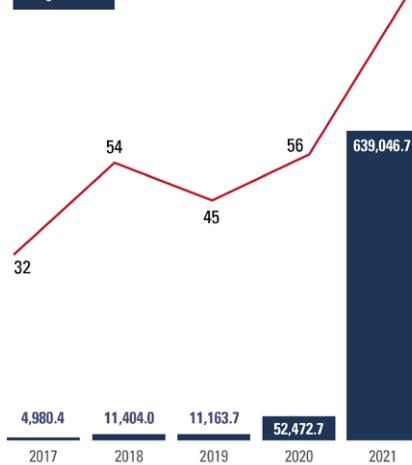

kilograms



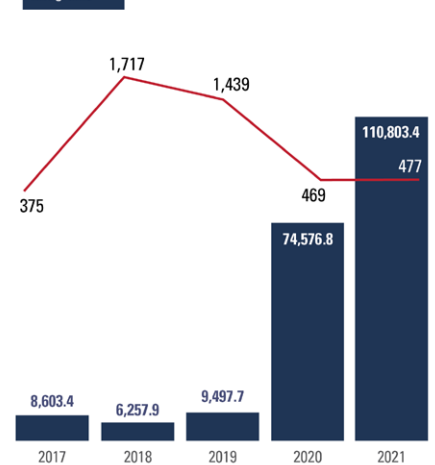

kilograms

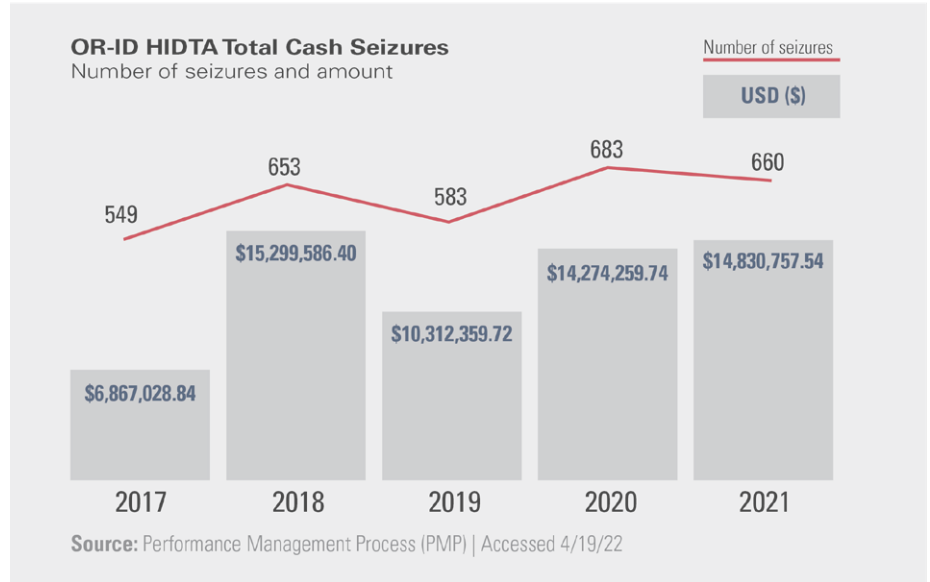

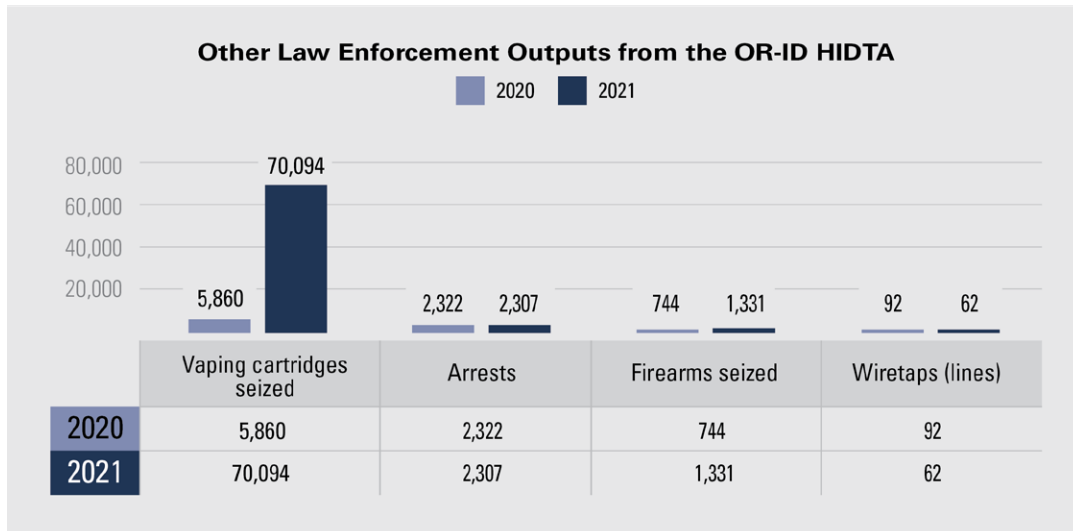
ASSET SEIZURES

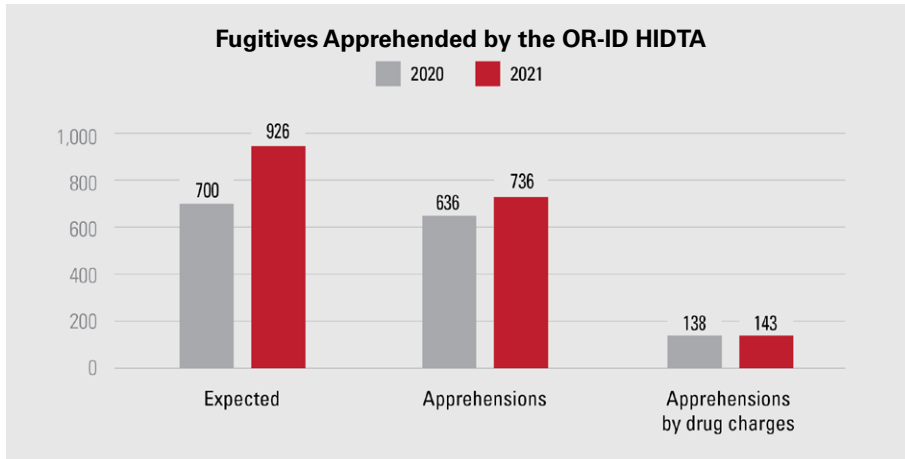
Oregon-Idaho HIDTA initiatives seized approximately \$14.8 million in cash and other assets related to illicit drug trafficking operations during the 2021 calendar year.



ARRESTS AND FIREARM SEIZURES

In 2021, Oregon-Idaho initiatives made 2,307 arrests during their investigations. A total of 1,331 firearms and 70,094 vape cartridges were seized throughout the HIDTA region.





FUGITIVE APPREHENSIONS

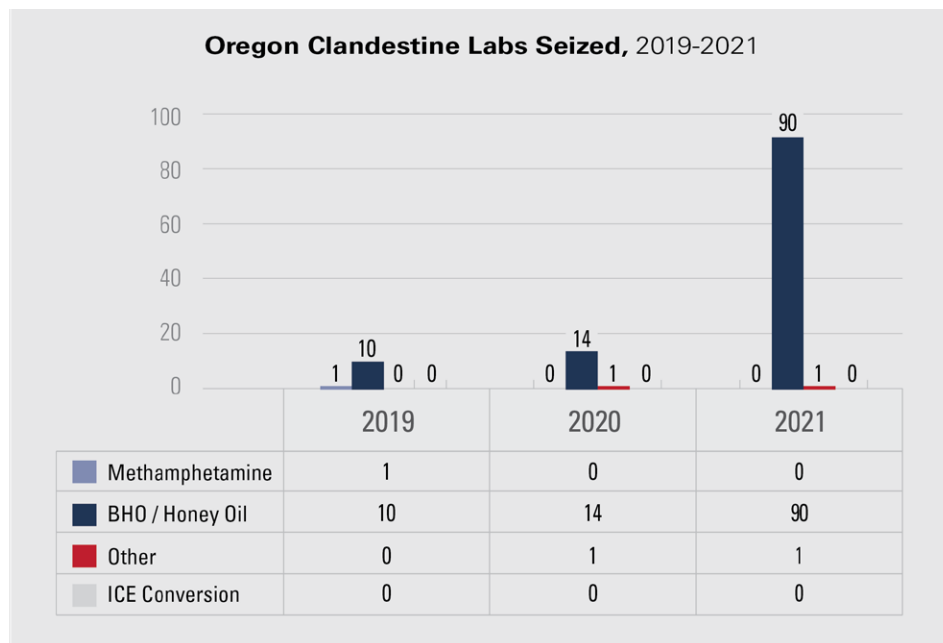
The US Marshals Service Fugitive Task Force (USMS FTF) works with the other Oregon-Idaho HIDTA initiatives to apprehend fugitives. During 2021, USMS FTF apprehended 736 fugitives, of which 143 (22%), were drug offenders.

PROSECUTIONS

The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA supports one prosecution initiative that is located at the District of Idaho US Attorney’s Office. HIDTA funds a Special Assistant United States Attorney (SAUSA) position that provides prosecution support to HIDTA enforcement initiatives. During 2021, the SAUSA facilitated 28 suspect indictments, 30 prosecutions, and 5 convictions. A total of 30 search warrants and 5 court orders were reviewed as well. The initiative’s outputs are similar to the past few years with no significant changes noted.

CLANDESTINE LAB SEIZURES

The number of clandestine laboratories seized in the HIDTA region increased from 11 in 2020 to 91 in 2021, with the majority (90) related to cannabis extraction for the purpose of producing “BHO/Honey Oil”. One lab seized was a fentanyl conversion lab.



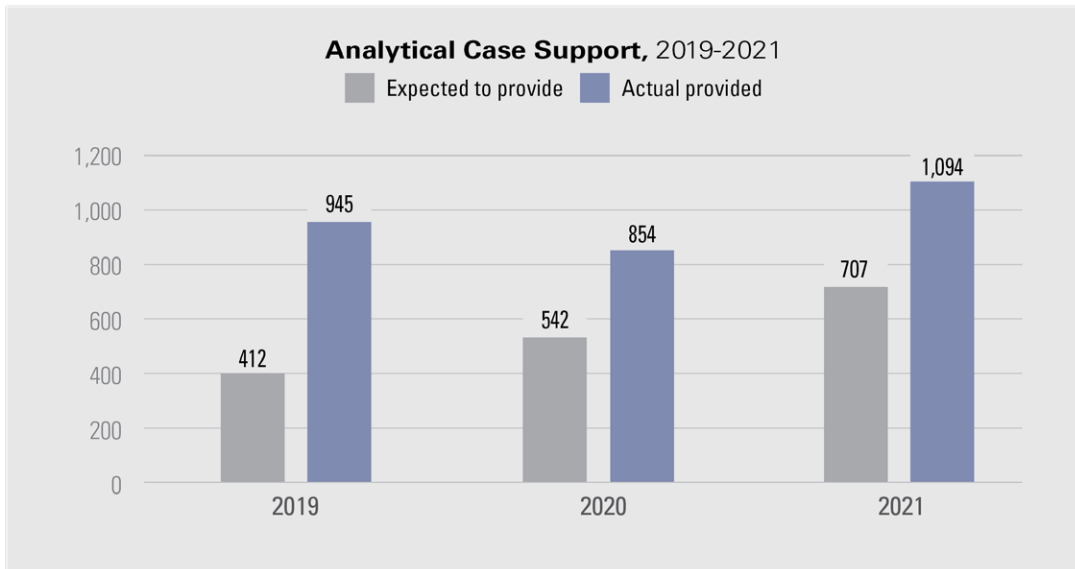
GOAL 2: Improve the efficiency and effectiveness of HIDTA initiatives

ANALYTICAL CASE SUPPORT

In 2021, local, state and federal criminal intelligence analysts assigned to enforcement initiatives provided analytical services to 1,094 drug cases in the region.

The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA ISC, which serves as a regional hub for sharing case deconfliction of drug intelligence among federal, state, local and tribal law enforcement agencies in the region, provided in-depth case support for 33 of these investigations. Forty-four

cases were closed during the calendar year and case support survey results showed that 100% of the task force officers felt the work provided was accurate and useful. The ISC also published seven strategic documents during 2021 which were sent to approximately 850 recipients. 100% of the recipients who responded to post distribution surveys indicated that the bulletin content was effective and useful.



DECONFLICTION

The initiatives utilize RISSIntel and RISSafe, provided by the Regional Information Sharing Systems (RISS) as well as Case Explorer, to provide deconfliction of case information and enforcement operations (events). Nearly 42,000 case, subject, and event deconflictions were conducted in 2021. The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA enforcement initiatives and the ISC processed 4,676 event and 37,092 target/investigative deconfliction information.

TRAININGS PROVIDED

The mission of the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA Training initiative is to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA enforcement, intelligence and support initiatives in the region through training, networking, and information sharing opportunities. This is accomplished by providing relevant, high priority training on a regular and timely basis.

In 2021, the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA Training initiative provided 14,098 hours of training to 1,314 students, a significant increase over 2020.



DRUG PREVENTION

In 2021, Oregon-Idaho HIDTA partnered with and provided support two drug prevention initiatives in order to impact public awareness and safety surrounding drug abuse in Oregon and Idaho. Those two initiatives are Lines for Life, which is a regional program dedicated to preventing substance abuse and suicide, and Children Learning through Education and Research (CLEAR) Alliance, which focuses on preventing and reducing youth substance abuse and impaired driving through fact-based education.

Lines for Life: Rapid Response Team for Opioid Overdose

The Rapid Response Team for Opioid Overdose will conduct expanded post-overdose investigations, target harm reduction and prevention strategies based on the information gathered in these investigations; and ensure we have the best, most timely data possible.

During 2021, Multnomah County Medical Examiner staff identified opportunities for contact and intervention with additional people at risk of overdose on the scene of suspected fatal overdoses and throughout enhanced death investigations. Death investigators completed naloxone administration training and were provided access to naloxone kits to distribute. Lines for Life and Multnomah County produced a resource brochure for addiction and treatment services for death investigators to distribute.

Lines for Life began developing a follow-up program to ensure linkages to treatment for individuals with substance use disorder. Death investigators will be able to offer individuals encountered on the scene of a suspected overdose or during enhanced death investigations a follow-up call from Lines for Life to discuss treatment and recovery services. The next priority for the Rapid Resonse Team is to expand into nonfatal overdoses. Lines for Life is actively pursuing a partnership with Clackamas County to provide nonfatal overdose post intervention and referrals to services

Lines for Life: YouthLine

YouthLine is a free teen-to-teen crisis support and help line that connects young people with trained teen volunteers who understand and can help with any problem, big or small.

During 2021, YouthLine has trained 10 new youth volunteers and interns in the Central Oregon call center. YouthLine has collaborated with multiple higher education programs to offer YouthLine as a site for internships, adding Tulane University, University of New Hampshire and Arizona State since 2020, while still holding long term partnerships with Oregon State University – Cascades and Portland State University Social Work program. The Central Oregon call center currently has 20 volunteers/interns who actively take contacts from youth reaching out for support.

Between 2020 and 2022 the Central Oregon call center more than doubled its phone line available shifts to better support the increase in contacts needing support. The call centers have experienced a growth rate of around 38% in new contacts (chats, calls, and texts) annually, reaching over 28,000 youth in 2020 and expect to receive 35,000 contacts by the end of 2022. Central Oregon Youthline volunteers and staff provided materials and resource information to community members and youth during more than 30 outreach events and classroom lessons between 2021 and the end of 2022. The continued on-site work of the youth volunteers throughout the COVID-19 pandemic and beyond continues to be crucial in meeting this need and supporting youth struggling with the many unprecedented changes in their lives.

CLEAR Alliance

Children Learning through Education and Research (CLEAR) Alliance focuses on preventing and reducing youth substance abuse and impaired driving through fact-based education. CLEAR Alliance has increased public awareness and education through their “Did You Know?” advertisements. These ads are running in 29 Oregon counties through the use of electronic billboards, print billboards, radio advertisements, posters at schools and social media outreach. CLEAR Alliance has also seen national growth with ads being purchased by out-of-state school districts and prevention representatives for use in their respective areas.

During 2021, CLEAR Alliance updated, revised, and adapted the Oregon Tobacco Marijuana & E-cigarettes

Course (TMEC) and Impaired Driving Education Course (IDEC) curriculums into a National TMEC and National IDEC curriculum. CLEAR Alliance provided TMEC and IDEC programs to HIDTA’s National Marijuana Initiative staff to review and audit. CLEAR Alliance learned in December 2021 that the National Marijuana Initiative is endorsing both curriculums. CLEAR Alliance is committed to adding all of their educational materials, website information, billboards and Radio PSA’s in Spanish; most of this was accomplished in 2021. CLEAR Alliance is now partnering with the non-profit, Song for Charlie to develop a curriculum for Fentanyl and Counterfeit Pills that will be titled the Counterfeit Pills Education Course (CPEC).



OVERDOSE RESPONSE STRATEGY

The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA core Overdose Response Strategy (ORS) strategic purpose includes information engagement with law enforcement, coordination with public health, and supporting the prevention mission. The ORS is a national HIDTA initiative designed to enhance public health public safety collaboration and strengthen and improve efforts to reduce drug overdoses across all states and HIDTA regions. With support from the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the ORS initiative supports innovation at the local, state, and regional level.

The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA recognizes the importance of the collaboration between public health and safety organizations with a common goal to reduce fatal and non-fatal overdose in our area of responsibility. The ORS team consists of a Drug Intelligence Officer (DIO)

and Public Health Analyst (PHA) in both Oregon and Idaho. In 2020 the DIO for Oregon was hired and in 2021 the team was completed with the addition of an Idaho DIO and a PHA for each state. Together they work to provide technical assistance to local jurisdictions; produce educational materials; increase data sharing; and promote national ORS goals. The DIO’s support HIDTA’s traditional goal to disrupt and dismantle drug trafficking organizations, by facilitating Felony Arrest Notifications (FAN’s) that connect investigations across jurisdictions. With support from the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Foundation, the ORS initiative supports innovation at the local, state, and regional level.

TECHNOLOGY

ODMAP

The Overdose Detection Mapping Application Program (ODMAP) provides near real-time overdose surveillance data across jurisdictions to support public safety and public health efforts to mobilize an immediate response to a sudden increase, or spike in overdose events. Emergency responders (law enforcement, EMS, fire/rescue) input overdose events, including the fatal or nonfatal outcomes, as well as naloxone dosage. With the creation of ODMAP, jurisdictions have a unique and unprecedented opportunity to respond to suspected overdose spikes.

ODMAP data assists decision-makers in the development of strategies and tactics designed to curb the spread of substance use disorders and reduce overdose occurrences. Since the introduction of ODMAP within the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA region, its use in both states has grown. In 2021, overdose data entered by 378 individual users working for 76 Oregon and Idaho participating agencies

included 961 suspected overdoses – 243 of which were fatal; and indicated that naloxone was administered 624 times

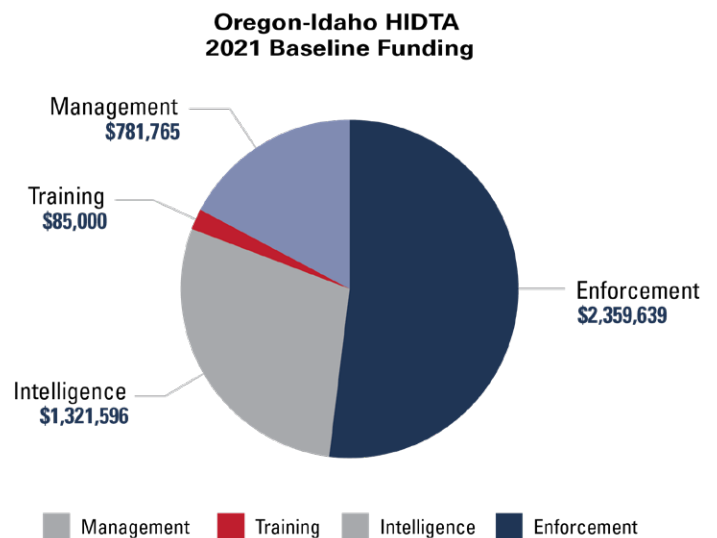
GrayKey

In 2020 the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA supported the purchase of GrayKey digital forensic access tool that extracts encrypted or inaccessible data from mobile devices to further criminal investigations. The device has been housed and operated at the Nampa, Idaho Police Department since the 3rd quarter of 2020. During 2021, the device was used to extract data from phones 33 times - 6 drug crimes, 8 child pornography cases, 6 homicides, 5 domestic violence cases, 2 adult rape cases, 3 child sex abuse cases and 3 property crimes cases. The tool has enabled investigators to retrieve evidence from devices that was previously unattainable and assisted in the identification of additional drug trafficking, gun crime, and sexual assault suspects.



2021 BUDGET ALLOCATION

In 2021, Oregon-Idaho HIDTA received \$4,548,000 in baseline and discretionary funding from ONDCP to support the program’s strategy. Funds are distributed by the Executive Board based upon the identified threat, response strategy, and need of the initiatives established within designated areas of the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA. 52% of the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA’s 2021 funding allocation was distributed to enforcement initiatives, 29% was allocated to intelligence initiatives, 17.2% was dedicated to management and 1.9% supported training.
